New Interior Outreach & Education Coordinator



Duck or Ptarmigan Jalapeno Popper Recipe

INGREDIENTS

4-6 duck/ptarmigan breasts
1 package bacon (we prefer turkey)
1 jar sliced jalapeño peppers
8 oz block of cream cheese

DIRECTIONS

1. Cut breasts into bite size pieces.
2. Cut cream cheese into bite size pieces.
3. Cut each bacon slice in half.
4. Assemble poppers: Roll one piece of duck, one piece of cream cheese, and 1-2 slices of jalapeño peppers inside bacon half. Secure with toothpick.
5. Place poppers on tinfoil on cookie sheet.
6. Bake at 350° for 20-30 minutes.
